Lesson Plan



### Learning the Difference Between "There" and "Their"

# Objective:

Students will be able to differentiate between the homophones "there" and "their" and correctly use them in sentences.

### Materials Needed:

- Whiteboard and markers
- Printed worksheets with sentences containing "there" and "their"
- Examples of sentences using "there" and "their"

# Lesson Outline:

### Introduction (5 minutes):

- 1. Begin by writing the words "there" and "their" on the whiteboard.
- 2. Explain that these words are **homophones**, meaning they sound the same but have different meanings and spellings.
- 3. Examples of sentences: "there" and "their".

Jenny and Tom lost **their** keys at the park.

### Discussion (10 minutes):

- 1. Review the answers as a class, discussing why "there" and "their" are used in specific sentences.
- 2. Clarify any misconceptions and provide additional examples if needed.
- 3. Encourage students to ask questions and seek clarification.

### Activity 2 - Application (15 minutes):

- 1. Ask students to come up with their own sentences using "there" and "their."
- 2. Have each student share their sentence with the class, explaining their choice of word.
- 3. Provide feedback and corrections as necessary.

#### Wrap-Up (5 minutes):
